The runes in this piece are called, in Old English, gyfu, meaning gift; the shape is an X. I placed this symbol "X" numerous times on one half of the piece using them as a graphic background. "Beginning" references new growth, the seeds of a beginning: the gold glitter extending from the bottom right corner, and two green leaves and a yellow flower represent the actual fulfillment of that growth.

LETTER IN RUNES oil, charcoal and gold leaf on paper



Runes: Where to start? By casting the book of changes (I Ching), "resolution with one moving line" appeared. From The Man of Many Qualities, here is a quote from the Austrian Arnold Schonberg: "Extravagant emotion is the fever that purges the soul of impurity." The moving line changes caused the divination to change into the Creative Principle. A quote by the Italian Poet Eugenio Montale, also from The Man of Many Qualities: "Bring me then the plant that points to those bright Lucidities swirling up from the earth, And life itself exhaling that central breath! Bring me the sunflower crazed with the love of light." Which then leads to the rune Sigel, the Sun.

RUNIC ALPHA BOOK, handmade artist's book, woodcut, monotype and gold leaf on French Arches black paper


In this handmade book, twenty-one images of a runic alphabet are printed with interspersed gold leafed herring images. Many of the surviving rune stones are believed to be memorials to fishermen lost at sea. Herring is and was one of the most sought after catches. While overfishing of many species of fish is endangering their survival, herring is not in danger of extinction.

In the Old Futhark alphabet in use from c. 200 - 800 AD, the rune Raidō was interpreted to mean ride. I consult the runes for guidance and, during an especially difficult time in early 2012, I selected three sets of 3 runes each for these time frames: Now, Next, and Eventually. The 3 runes that gave me strength to follow a new direction were: Dagaz (Breakthrough), Uruz (Strength), and Thuriaz (Gateway). This monotype reflects a new focus in my art. Having been primarily an abstract oil painter, I now also explore printmaking, using very bright colors and clear shapes in a spontaneous and surprising way. I used the shapes of these runes freely and simply as a design element.

The runes that I used as inspiration for this work include Raido, for growth in the journey; Ansuz for inspiration, a true vision and self-knowledge; Gebo for sharing with others, and Wunjo for fellowship and joy
