marc ellen hamel: a return to my roots

In 1901, my maternal grandmother, Ellen, at the young age of 16 left the family farm in Småland, Sweden, and emigrated to America. She settled in Seattle and married another Swede; I grew up hearing the Swedish phrases of my grandmother. Ellen died in 1966, never having returned to her homeland. In September 2015, together with my sister Betsy, I flew on a direct flight from Oakland to Stockholm to meet my relatives, the first time for my sister, the second time for me (I had visited earlier in 1997). We were fortunate to stay in the farmhouse where our grandmother was born since the farmhouse and surrounding land is still in the family. It became a special reconnection - to family, to the country, to the land. A dinner attended by 20 relatives was given in our honor and we met many distant cousins. The Swedish language has specific words for family connections: syssling (second cousin), brylling (third cousin), and fjärde kusin (fourth). We settled on just using "kusin." Many relatives still live near the old family farm, just south of Växjö, while others have moved to Lund and Stockholm. The dinner allowed us share information and memories and expanded the fabric of our family.

I loved the natural beauty of Sweden with its endless miles of trees and lakes, lovely wooden homes, and friendly people. The family homestead was quite large and included many acres of forest, plus a small lake with an island. Our grandmother's home and its many barns were painted in the traditional brownish red color with white trim, typical of other homes that we admired, with Dala horses and candelabras displayed in the windows. Highlights included a visit to Sigtuna, the oldest settlement in Sweden, and "The Kingdom of Crystal" in Småland where we visited a small artisan-run "glass bod" and the large Kosta Boda glass factory. At Uppsala University, I was particularly excited to see runestones, many of which had been moved there from other locations and I learned that most of these ancient runestones were erected in honor of a person and not a battle. Throughout the country, I appreciated seeing the old and well-preserved architecture as my eyes were drawn to the fine brickwork in Gothenburg's buildings and the spires, gargoyles, archways, and many elegant entryways in both Gothenburg and Stockholm's Gamla Stan, the oldest section of the city. Wishing to see folk handicrafts and Swedish interiors and furniture through the ages brought me to the Nordiska Museet, a venerable building reminiscent of a cathedral.

interview with ceramic sculptor barbara stevens strauss by Helena Tiainen

Q: Tell me about yourself as an artist.

A: I am a ceramic sculptor with Danish heritage and a special passion for the raku method of firing. I began creating sculpture in Naples, Florida, in the late 90's, when I began studying the Japanese flower arranging, ikebana. I found that making vessel forms dovetailed with my need to find containers for my new interest. When I moved to the East Bay in 2003, I was looking for a place to practice Zen meditation and found Yoshie Akiba, founder of the famous jazz club, and her Japanese zendo, a meditation hall, only blocks away from my new home. She became my tea ceremony teacher and her husband, Rev. Gengo Akiba, my Zen teacher. All of these influences, as well as studying ikebana with Soho Sakai, a renowned master, have distilled in me an appreciation for the Japanese aesthetic that has become the hallmark of my artistic expression.

Q: How did you get the idea of hosting the monthly Berkeley Art Parties?

A: The idea for the Berkeley Art Party came to me as a result of realizing that artists' opportunities to show and sell art in galleries were dwindling. Although my own work had been selected for many shows and venues in California, sales were rare. The main impetus began when I started sharing a studio at the Sawtooth Building in Berkeley in 2013. I had the desire to create some kind of an artist community and was fortunate to have enough space to do this in my Sawtooth studio which I share with Mike DaSilva who makes ukuleles and is a highly regarded luthier.

Q: What is the Berkeley Art Party?

A: Currently the Berkeley Art Party is a community-building event, meant to showcase four different artists on the second Friday of each month. We always have music, food and beverages. All work is for sale, and the artists' bios and promotional materials are available so that attendees can get to know the artists during the event. It's effectively a pop-up gallery on display for one evening. The parties are free and there is ample parking space. We've been drawing a crowd of 40-60 people each month. Our website features upcoming shows and past exhibiting artists with links to their own sites, and we currently take no commission. The Berkeley Art Party is evolving with each event and we may add performance, interactive, and academic presenters in the future.

A: Without exception, participating artists, and even more so, attendees, have enjoyed the Berkeley Art Parties. These parties require very minimal effort on the part of the artists, since Mike and I hang the shows and provide the musical entertainment as well as the refreshments. Maj-Britt Mobrand is retiring and closing her teaching business, Glimakra Weaving Studio, at the end of October. She will continue to show her wall weavings and scarves at various galleries. Diane Rus**nak** has created a 150 page archival scrapbook focusing on three early feminist art galleries/ groups that she participated in from the early 1970's, on exhibit at "Art Capital of the West - Real and Imagined Art Museums and Galleries in Berkeley", Veterans Memorial Building, Berkeley, CA, through April 2, 2016. Magic Carpet Ride - Report from Athens by Kornelios Grammenos

Kati Casida, Patricia Bengtson-Jones, Maj-Britt Hilstrom and Kristin Lindseth - exhibited their sculpture in "Magic Carpet Ride" which opened at ekfrasi-Yianna Grammatopoulou Gallery in Athens, Greece, on September 24. Kati Casida and Maj-Britt Hilstrom were present at the reception which was attended by more than 400 people. An international collaboration between a group of Athenian sculptors and the Pacific Rim Sculpture Group, the show was conceived and organized by Kati Casida and curated by UC Berkeley Professor Emeritus Peter Selz and Greek artist Kornelios Grammenos, who also designed the exhibition display. The exhibition catalogue with color plates and artist statements was edited and designed by Helene Sobol.

In three days, they filmed me in my living room, at Mills College Art Museum, at Nordstrom in Walnut Creek, where I have worked for sixteen years, and finished in my bedroom where I talked about the importance and attributes of jewelry. Now I feel very honored and happy I had this opportunity as it was unexpected and I was surprised to be noticed.
