artist profile

Ulla de Larios joined Nordic 5 Arts in the early 1990's, after graduating from the San Francisco Art Institute. Her favorite quote is from Wayne Thiebaud who calls himself a *painter* because the title *artist* is for other people to bestow on him. Ulla de Larios calls herself a *weaver*. She was born and raised in a big family on the West Coast of Sweden, where her grandmother taught her how to weave.

At age 24, after studying Math and Physics at the University of Lund,

she immigrated to Berkeley, California, and later spent many years in Seeley Lake in the mountains of Montana. It was while in Montana that she got her first big loom. It was only in1984, when her family moved to Palo Alto, that she started taking classes in art. In 1990 she got her BFA in painting at the San Francisco Art Institute and later her MFA in textile arts at SFSU. Ulla states that her art education widened her viewpoing and gave her some insight into the way the art world works and gave her focus in her work, but didn't change her. She feels

fortunate to have qualified for a studio space in Palo Alto at Cubberley Community Center. This studio gave her the impetus to move from making cloth for practical purposes to expressing her ideas artistically through the weaving process. Ulla's inspiration comes from the yarn and the process of weaving in which the yarn, the structure, the sett, the color and the final size all have to come together, and varying any of these aspects will change the end result. She recently received a large quantity of beautiful linen that she is planning on spending much time admiring and deciding how to use.

In 2015 Ulla moved from a spacious studio in Palo Alto, where she could make and show large 3 dimensional work, to a small cottage in the back of her home in Berkeley. The smaller space has made the scale of her work also smaller and most likely she will primarily make weavings that hang on the wall. The biggest influence on Ulla's art has been being an immigrant. She spent many years comparing Sweden to the United States. She sees the feeling of being in between the two countries and not really belonging to one or the other as the basis for much of her work. She weaves a little man into most of her pieces. This man is a depiction of the huge number of migrants that are so much in the news these days. From time to time she also makes more directly political works. "Transparency?", (photo), was made during the change from the Bush to the Obama administration. The individual pieces in this series have titles, but Ulla de Larios leaves it up to the viewer to decide which piece should have which of the names: Par for the Course, Malfeasance, Hope, The Last Eight, and The Next Eight.

Patricia Bengtson Jones recently found that her DNA is 59% Swedish, plus Ireland 13%, Italy/Greece 9%, Eastern Europe 9%, Great Britain 5%, Western Europe 5%, and 6% other European. This has started her on a new series inspired by x-rays of her bones and how many miles they have walked. From that series is "Waiting to Migrate," 9"x12" pastels and drawing pen. She also began a new Runes series, which includes "Journey to Flowing New Friends," 9"x12", pastel on paper, Sharpie pen, pan pastel colors.

One of **Kati Casida's** aluminum sculptures, "Red Jazz," $11' \times 9'$, has been installed in the Orinda Plaza in the city of Orinda, CA, and can be seen there through November 1, 2017 (Photo p. 4).

Colette Crutcher is currently creating a mosaic panel for inside the library of Daniel Webster Elementary School in San Francisco as a memorial to a much-loved parent who spearheaded the fundraising effort for the new library, who died shortly thereafter. She is also in the planning stages for a major artistic enhancement of Visitacion Valley Elementary School, working with Aileen Barr to create mosaics for the entrance to the building, and a seating wall and tiled lizard sculpture for the new school garden. In late April, she will participate for the fourth time in "Draw Till You Drop," an art marathon to raise funds for the Arts Council of Mendocino County. She is also working with a professor at SF State Theater Department to create oversized paper maché puppets for use in protest marches in late April and early May.

Jason Engelund was recently appointed the part time position of Studio Director at the Adobe Art Center in Castro Valley where he'll work on supporting art instructors, developing new arts curriculum and opportunities for the public, community engagement and studio maintenance. "After teaching drawing fundamentals and still life class and helping in the gallery at the art center, I proposed they create a Studio Director position to help revitalize the art center. I'm happy to see some changes and help to revitalize this art center as I see lots of potential."

Mark Erickson Is working on a project he started in 2015, "The Family Photographic Project," which is restoration and colorization of dozens of classic family photos from the late 1800s to the late 1960s. Included are images from Sweden, WW1, WW2, and the Chuck Berry fueled rock and roll cold war of the 1950s, and finally into the sun splashed era of the 1960s. Pam Fingado is part of a group exhibit at Britt Marie's Café & Wine Bar, 1369 Solano Ave. Albany CA 94706. The exhibit will be on view May 3 - June 30, 2017. Artists include Pam Fingado, Lisa Greenstein and Hershell West. Pam is also part of the Art Exhibit, "BLUE," showing from July 22 – August 20, 2017, at San Pablo Art Gallery, 13831 San Pablo Ave, San Pablo, CA 94806. This group show features artists from Artist Salon of The East Bay. The Reception is on Saturday, July 22, 1-3 pm.

Marc Ellen Hamel's nature-inspired abstract oil paintings were exhibited in a two-person show called "House and Garden" in Gallery Sanchez at Noe Valley Ministry, 1021 Sanchez Street, San Francisco, December 2016 - February 2017. In April, she opened her studio for Spring Open Studio at Hunters Point Shipyard. During the month of May, she will have a solo show of paintings and monotypes called "Urban Scenes/Rural Walks" at Think Round Fine Arts, 2140 Bush Street, San Francisco CA 94115. The poster in the show is an original, not a reprint, and the museum is selling reproductions in a variety of sizes, plus postcards and refrigerator magnets.

To the question about what is hardest to her as an artist Ulla de Larios replies: "The hardest thing for me is marketing my art. It does not fit my personality and I always hear in the back of my head my uncle's disdainful words about artists who have no substance but good marketing." To the question about what is easiest to her as an artist, she replies: "The work. I have always been interested in yarns and what to make from them, whether I spin, knit, embroider or crochet. Weaving is the ultimate fiber craft, but it takes a large amount of time and energy just to get set up. But the other processes, knitting for instance, are easy and always available." ulladelarios.com.
