


swedish design expo

The Swedish Design Expo 2005, on Saturday, October 1, is from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. in the spectacular four story atrium Galleria in the San Francisco Design Center. Annika Bjorklund, project manager, announces that the exhibition is sponsored by the Swedish-American Chamber of Commerce in San Francisco in conjunction with *Dwell Magazine*, IKEA, and H&M. This unique exhibition aims to promote Swedish design in its numerous forms—ranging from fashion, architecture and furnishings to industrial design. Swedish design has a rich heritage stemming from its more than a century-old industry. It is diverse, and many internationally famous names are connected to it, such as the architect-trio Claesson Kovisto Rune. Marten Claesson will be present at the Swedish Design Expo. Other prominent speakers will be Peter Hallen, architect and designer; Fredrik Magnusson, CEO and founder of the industrial design consultancy Propeller; and Clay Bond, one of Sweden's most prominent trend analysts. Andrew Wagner, senior editor of *Dwell Magazine* and Raul Cabra, design consultant and one of the editors, with Katherine E. Nelson, of the book *New Scandinavian Design*, will also speak at the Expo. The speakers will unravel the secrets to the success of Swedish design. sensuous curve: scandinavian design then and now

The Sensuous Curve: Scandinavian Design Then and Now will be at the Museum of Craft & Folk Art, Fort Mason, from November 2, 2005 until January 22, 2006. The members' event is Wednesday, November 2, from 5:30 - 6:30 p.m. and the public reception is from 6:30 - 7:30 p.m. The curator of this exhibition is Kate Eilertsen, director of the museum. She writes in her introduction that modernist design elements from Scandinavia have used the sensuous curve to achieve beautiful objects of form and function. Designs created from 1940 to 1970 and today's generation of young designers will be identified, investigated, compared and contrasted. The work of influential designers from the early modern movement such as Finn Juhl and Arne Jacobson will be shown alongside contemporary designers such as Donald Fortescue and Emily McLennan. By comparing two generations of designers, the exhibition will show the impact that the sensuous curve continues to have in beautiful and functional designs as art and craft. Mark your calendar.

The Poet's House



Scale and Response

More than concept and design, more than material and technique, more than art or architecture, poetry house is about human scale and human space. The body knows, the blood approves, the spirit resonates.

Poetry House engenders response—come close, look carefully, touch gently, Enter in silence, feel and breath interior space.

Bruce Johnson tells us about his Poetry House: "Visiting the Sonoma Mountain Zen Center, I came upon this eloquent poem by Elizabeth Carothers Herron. It was there on Sonoma Mountain that eloquence and harmony converged and became *poetry house*. In the poem in Poetry House —prayers in a prayer wheel — Elizabeth has written an eloquent poem as part of the Poetry House Project. We have transcribed the lines from the poem onto all of the under layers of the building, inside and out, including the roof, walls, and floors, as well as the paper of the central lantern. The intention is to imbue this small, quite space with poetry. Like prayers in a prayer wheel, the invisible text resonates."

Layers of entry (see enclosed drawing).

"Poetry House is at home in nature, in a garden, within a circle of low stone walls, amid oaks and bays with views of mossy rocks and woodlands. The garden is the first layer of entry. Discovery of the small hut within the garden is the next layer of entry. Come close—let the Poetry House fill your frame of view. Recognize a hand-made building—intimate scale and attention to detail. Step under the low eaves and onto the simple porch remove your shoes; slide open the wood and copper door and step across the threshold. Within the light is subdued. As eyes adjust and awareness expands interior layers of space unfold." www.formandenergy.com

"I take photographs of strangers. They are people unknown to me, whose lives I briefly investigate through the act of photography. Watching people at cafes or chatting at parties, I am fascinated by people that I can never know anything about. My role as photographer gives me the key to accessing these anonymous existences.

"My images are concrete fictions: they are my fantasies about the lives of people who willingly invite me into their homes. My strangers are willing participants in this fantasy. Some of the people who want their picture taken are aspiring models; some are children of mothers who want a nice picture to give grandma. Others are simply lonely and enjoy the attention. Young girls can be awkward; old men can be graceful, yet all have a unique, strange beauty when I see them through the lens. I love my subjects and all of their insecurities, quirks, and individuality."

Siri received a B.A. in comparative literature with a minor in Italian from Smith College in 1998; an M.A. in Italian literature from Smith in 2001. She has taken marine photographic workshops in Rockport, Maine and coursework in platinum/palladium printing, lighting, and advanced color photography at the New School University in New York City.



diane rusnack

"I graduated from The Ohio State University and then moved west to Berkeley. I have taught art to thousands of people in public schools and colleges. I am best known for the women in art history courses I created and taught for over twenty-five years and for creating community artist support groups, galleries and studios. Currently I teach acrylic painting for Vista College in Berkeley.

"I am primarily a dream artist. That is, I write down my dreams (over 3,000) and use imagery from them. I use various media in both 2-D and 3-D. I was invited this summer to do a Cloth Dream Installation (50 laundry pieces on a clothesline) for the International Association for Study of Dreams conference in Berkeley.

"After socially doing Balkan dancing and attending many Eastern European ethnic events for decades, I recently decided to explore my mother's Finnish-American origins and customs. I have just completed a three-month show (Finnish laundry, 30 pieces) at FAHA (a Finnish-American home and cultural association) in Sonoma county. In August I attended the International Finnfest held in Marquette, MI, seat of the largest American Finnish community."
